Details of Teaching sessions:

**Purpose:**

1. An act to provide for the registration and regulation of clinical establishment in the country.
2. To prescribe minimum standards of facilities and services which may be provided by them.
3. Desired impact improvement in public health.

**Reality:**

Parliament has no power to make laws for the states with respect to any of the matters aforesaid articles 249 and 250 of the constitution.

**Applies to:**

1. Arunachal Pradesh, Himachal Pradesh, Mizoram, Sikkim and the Union Territories,
2. Likely to be adopted by all states.

**Who is included?:**

1. A clinical establishment owned, controlled or managed by
2. The Government or a department of the Government
3. A trust, whether public or private
4. A corporate (including a society) registered under a Central, Provincial or State Act, whether or not owned by the Government.
5. A local authority and
6. A single doctor

### The National Council for Clinical Establishments

1. These shall be established for the purposes of this act, a council to be called the National Council for Clinical Establishments.
2. Chair Person
3. Director-General of Health Service, Ministry of Health and Family Welfare.
4. Secretary Joint Secretary MOH GOI

### The National Councils functions

1. Compile and publish a National Register of clinical establishments within in two years from the date of the commencement of this act.
2. Classify the clinical establishments into different categories
3. Develop the minimum standards and their periodic review

### The National Councils functions

1. Determine within a period of two years from its establishment, the first set of standards for the ensuring proper healthcare by the clinical establishments.
2. Collect the statistics in respect of clinical establishments.
3. Perform any other function determined by the Central Government from time to time.

### State Council for clinical establishments

1. Every state government shall constitute a state council for Clinical establishments
2. Secretary, Health ex officio, who shall be the chairman.
3. Director of Health Services ex officio member-secretary.

### State Council functions

1. Compiling and updating the state register of clinical establishment
2. Sending monthly returns for updating the National Register
3. Representing the State in the National Council
4. Hearing of appeals against the orders of the authority and
5. Publication on annual basis a report on the state of implementation of standards within their respective states.

### District registering authority

1. The state government shall, set-up district registering authority.
2. District Collector-Chairperson

#### District registering authority functions

1. The District registering authority shall be responsible for
2. Grant, renewal, suspension or cancellation of registration.
3. Enforcing compliance
4. Investigation of complaints.
5. Preparation and submission of report
6. The District Medical Officer shall exercise the powers of the district health authority.

#### The process

1. Provisional registration with time limit
2. Inspection
3. Permanent registration.
4. Standards for permanent registration
5. The certificate shall be valid for a period of five years from the date of issue

#### Conditions

1. For registration and continuation, every clinical establishment shall fulfill the following conditions namely –
2. The minimum standards of facilities and services as may be prescribed.
3. The minimum requirement of personnel as may be prescribed.
4. Provisions for maintenance of records and reporting as may be prescribed.
5. Such other conditions as may be prescribed.

#### Mandatory clause

The clinical establishment shall undertake to provide within the staff and facilities available, such medical examination and treatment as may be required to stabilize the emergency medical condition of any individual who comes or is brought to such clinical establishment.

#### Rules

1. Monetary penalty for non-registration
2. Disobedience of order, obstruction and refusal of information.

3. Every clinical establishment shall, furnish such returns or the statistics and other information in such manner, as may be prescribed.
4. Shall maintain medical records of patients treated by it and health information and statistics in respect of national programmes and furnish the same to the district authorities in form of quarterly reports.
5. Copies of all records and statistics shall be kept with the clinical establishment concerned for at least 3 or 5 years.
6. Shall comply with the Standard Treatment Guidelines and maintain electronic medical records of every patient as may be notified by the Central Government from time to time.
7. Shall charge the rates for each type of procedure and service within the range of rates to be notified by the central government from time to time, for such procedures and services.
8. Shall display the rates charged for each type of service provided and facilities available, for the benefit of the patients at prominent place in the local dialect as well as in English language.
9. Shall establish mechanisms for review and audit for the purpose of provision of rational practice and service.
10. Shall carry out every prescription audits every 3 months.

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**STATE COUNCIL FUNCTIONS**

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**MINISTRY REGISTERING AUTHORITY**

This authority shall be established to register and supervise the work of clinical establishments in the State.

The authority shall be composed of representatives of the Ministry of Health and other relevant departments.

The authority shall be headed by the Minister of Health.

The authority shall have the right to propose and recommend to the State Council the appointment and dismissal of the heads of clinical establishments.

The Board of Directors of the Board of Directors will have the

Such amendments, repeals, or additions shall be made by  
 a majority vote of the Board of Directors.




